Early Voting: May 2-10, 7:00 am – 8:00 pm

To vote by mail, you must request a mail-in ballot from the State Board of Elections or your local board. Your request for a mail-in ballot for the Presidential Primary Election must be submitted as follows:

If you want to receive your ballot by mail or fax, your request must be received (not just mailed) by Tuesday, May 7, 2024.

If you want to receive your ballot via the internet, your request must be received by 5 pm, Friday, May 10, 2024 for a request sent in the mail, or by 11:59 pm, Friday, May 10, 2024 for a request sent by fax or submitted online.

Taking Care of Our Most Precious Resources

Our communities are valuable treasures where we strive to make residents feel cared for and protected. Community leaders put a lot of thought and energy into doing what they can to give residents the best possible environment to support a healthy life.

One of our local communities is taking significant steps to extend support for a healthy environment one step further. Victoria Falls is a 55+ community in Laurel that is actively working to educate residents about planet preserving practices. The idea started with one person, grew to three people, and now encompasses an active group of residents that has formed an Environmental Interest Group (EIG). The EIG is putting on a series of engaging programs to highlight actions all of us can take to protect our planet's precious resources. In addition to the programs they have already presented, the interest group developed a list of potential topics and they are surveying the community to see what programs would be of interest.

On the following pages, we are sharing some of the materials the Victoria Falls interest group has distributed to the attendees at their programs. The interest group is happy to share because the more effectively communities focus on educating residents, the more likely it is that Earth-protecting practices will be implemented.

For communities that want to start informing residents about Best Practices, it might be helpful to have people think about what they are already doing to care for the environment. Then, have people think about adopting one more environmentally responsible practice. If we can give everyone one small step at a time to take, we can increase the odds that new practices will become a habit and that one success will lead to more successes.
